From My Perspective Within The Kingdom

Many years ago, in a high school Sociology class, I was introduced to the concept of "role expectation." The idea behind role expectation is that whatever image is projected onto another person, he or she will often become that expectation we have of him or her. For example, if we repeatedly tell someone that he is lazy, we shouldn't be too surprised if he then accommodates our image of him by making that idea his reality. Or, think of a classroom where a teacher encourages her students by often telling them how bright or how special they are; surely, the class average will go up. Conversely, if another teacher is constantly telling her students how sorry they are and how they will never amount to much, it's not too surprising if and when her students aim their sights too low. If we repeatedly tell our baptized children that they are God's special delight, we hope and expect that our children will grow up with very healthy self-images and discover and develop their many gifts.

Now then, with this notion of role expectation in mind, I want to take to task a myth that is said about Presbyterians, a myth that perhaps you and I have chuckled about and repeated often enough that we have begun to believe it and accept it as reality. Most of my adult life, I have heard it said, many times and in many places, (and, I confess that I have said it as well), that "Presbyterians are God's frozen chosen!" That's a cute and whimsical statement about Presbyterians but don't you dare believe it, accept it, or live out that expectation for one moment because it is a lie!

Let me do my best to debunk the myth that Presbyterians are God's frozen chosen. First, let me say that there is some truth found within that claim. As we have been studying The Book of Confessions in our combined adult Summer Sunday School class, we have learned repeatedly that we Presbyterians are elected by God. In other words, God took the initiative and chose us; we did not choose God for ourselves. Thus, we truly are chosen by God and saved by grace and faith alone. That part is significant.

Presbyterians affirm the stewardship of the mind. After all, Jesus commanded us to "Love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength. The second is this: You shall love your neighbor as yourself" (Mark 12:30-31a). We love God in every way possible and that certainly includes loving God on an intellectual basis. John Calvin, who gave shape to Reformed theology during the Protestant Reformation, was an intellectual, and he put his stamp on our faith perspective. From Calvin on, Presbyterians have always stressed education and the life of the mind. However, that is not to say that we are frozen, "stuffed shirts" about our faith and our practice of the faith.

Here at First Presbyterian, we are certainly not frozen. You only have to look as far as the community cookout on June 19 to see how warm we really were/are (and, I'm talking about far more than the weather!). We welcomed and conversed with, we mixed and mingled, we fed and enjoyed being with more than a hundred of our neighbors from throughout the Martinsville area. By our actions, we said loudly and clearly that we are not frozen. Instead, we are warmhearted and outgoing Presbyterians, who love and serve the Lord and our neighbors with genuine compassion. So, don't live the lie that we are the frozen chosen of God. Keep up the good work, First Presbyterians!

News

The approach of Fall is always exciting as I look forward to seeing wonderful children, youth, and parents-some that I have already had the pleasure of knowing and some new ones as well.

We will be starting all musical activities the week after Labor Day. All groups will begin on Monday, September 10 and Tuesday, September 11th.

Input Please!

I have had wonderful support from the parents who have so willingly served to help our children and youth in their musical journey. I would like to ask those of you who are interested in helping me mold our program to come to a meeting with other like-minded parents. We have several issues to consider, such as fellowship and mission possibilities. If you would be willing to meet with me once in August, and then probably two more times during the musical year, please let me know. I will find a time that suits the majority. Your time will be used wisely. We will plan to meet early in August.

Classes for Fall

I am really looking forward to fall and getting back with the children, youth and wonderful adults with whom I am fortunate to work. The schedule is basically the same with a tweak here and there

We are always looking for new friends. If you know someone that might enjoy being part of our musical family, please let me know, and I will call them or send a news letter.

Fall Schedule is as follows:

The schedule for the fall takes into account that we have children coming from 5 different school systems, each of whom has different time schedules for dismissal. The city school children are dismissed first, hence the early beginning time. We will have enrichment activities until all children arrive.

Monday: 2:45-4:30 WAM (Worship, Arts and Music) for 1st –5th graders (Singing, drama, playing instruments, handbells/handchimes all combined). I pick up the children from Patrick Henry at 2:45. Others come in as their individual school schedules allow. The children will be grouped by grade and will rotate through an exciting afternoon of music, crafts and games. This is the year we have two plays, so that is always a treat!!

We are going to need significant parental involvement in this group. The work that it takes to put on a Christmas and a Lenten play is enormous and it is simply more than I can handle. If everyone takes on a small responsibility, we have more ownership and no one is overwhelmed.

Tuesday: 11:00-11:45 <u>Music Together</u> (Early musical experiences for children from birth through 3 years with parent or caregiver)
There is a limited number of spaces, so please let me know if you are interested since church members have priority. We will be purchasing at-home materials for this group to use at home. There will be 3 quarters, Fall, Winter, and Spring and the cost for the materials is \$35 for each quarter. Please make checks out to the church, ear marked for *Music Together*.

12:00-1:30 <u>Kindermusik I</u> (Sequential musical experiences ie, singing drama, games, and play for 4year olds. The children bring their lunches and then we have our class together. (Parents come at 1:30 for the wrap up) The fee for church members is \$35. The \$35 covers the child's bag and glockenspiel, but you can borrow them from friends and save yourself some money! The fee for non members is \$150 for the year. Again, if you borrow a bag and glock from someone, your fee is reduced by \$35.

2:45-4:00 <u>Kindermusik II</u>,(Sequential musical experiences in reading, singing multi cultural music and playing for Kindergartners. The children will learn to play their own dulcimers and recorders). This is a continuation of Kindermusik I, but others who have not had Kindermusik I are welcome. Parents come at 3:55 for the wrap-up time) There is no fee for members, and non members' fee is \$150.

I would like to have a Middle school group. The group can decide if it would like the direction to be handbells, plays, or instrumental. We need 6 dedicated musicians to make it a go. Day and time would be decided on by the group.

<u>Cantabile Ringers!</u> This is a group for advanced handbell players. We meet on a day that suits the group, usually Sunday after church. This is for 8th graders and up.

Please sign up on the right and let me hear from you if you have questions, suggestions or comments. In order for me to be able to order music and materials, I need your completed form by **August 20**th. You can mail them, drop them in the offering plate on a Sunday, or put in my box in the office.

**Classes begin the week of September 7th. (WAM will begin the next Monday)
