Pastor's Corner

This devotional message was originally published in August of last year, but as I thought about all of the strife in the world on the one hand, and all of the positive changes and exciting possibilities for our future, I remembered this scripture. Paul's message reminds us of our calling as members of the Body of Christ. What a blessing and responsibility it is to be the church in this place and time.

Life Together Ephesians 4:1-6

"Therefore, I encourage you to live as a people worthy of the call you received from God. Conduct yourselves with all humility, gentleness, and patience. Accept each other with love, and make an effort to preserve the unity of the Spirit with the peace that ties you all together. You are one body, and one spirit, just as God also called you in one hope. There is one Lord, one faith, one baptism, and one God and Father of all, who is over all, through all, and in all." (CEB)

Outside my kitchen window is an oak tree that has probably been there for the better part of fifty years. One of the tree's most interesting features is the large burl that has formed on its trunk on the side of the tree facing the house. When we moved in, there were two smaller burls, but over the last twenty years they have continued to grow to the point where they have closed the gap between them and they are growing together. Burls are a collection of woody cells called callus tissue which cause a disruption in the growth pattern

of the trunk of a tree as a result of damage from insects, bacteria, fungi, or an injury. While they may look diseased, they generally don't interfere with the growth of an otherwise healthy tree and allow the tree to keep growing.

We are also familiar with callus tissue that builds up on various parts of our body to protect them from the wear and tear of repetitive use. Think of the fingertips of guitar players, the lips of brass players, and the feet of dancers and runners. If we have the misfortune to break a bone, our body sets to work healing the bone by deploying special cells to the break site to first form a soft callus that will hold the bone together, and later replacing that with a hard callus, and then finally after about six weeks replacing the callus with regular bone.

Whether on trees or on people, calluses are a special kind of helpful hardening that serves a protective and healing function. Calluses of this nature are good. What's not so good is when we form a metaphorical callus around our heart—our thoughts and emotions. This hardening usually begins as the result of an emotional trauma. The trauma can be the result of circumstances such as a great loss, or intentional abuse or injury by another person. In the short term, a protective layer around our emotions might help us to "make it through" the pain of the initial injury, but unlike helpful calluses, if hardness of heart is allowed to remain, it gets harder and more impenetrable and it stunts the growth and interactions of the affected person. The longer and more carefully people nurse their pain, the harder their heart gets and the more isolated and bitter they become.

When we have calluses in places where we don't want them, we soften them with balm and then gently file them away. In today's scripture, Paul describes a loving, accepting, nurturing community that has been called together by God and knit together by the peace and unity of the Holy Spirit. Being an active part of this community provides us with a balm to ease the pain that comes to each of us throughout our lives. Being surrounded by the love and nurture of such a community helps to remove the hardened spots on our psyche much like the gentle motion of the water smooths away the roughness of stones.

Of course, reaping the restorative benefits of living within a Christian community is only half of the story. We are called to BE that community and to be worthy of our calling. That means sharing what we have received from God with others. People who are hurting don't need us to preach at them. They need someone to walk alongside them, to sit with them, to talk

with them, and to humbly, gently and patiently share the love and compassion of God through our presence with them. With God's help through the love of Jesus and the power of the Holy Spirit, we are called to be the balm that helps to heal the hardened hearts in the world.

"Glory to God, who is able to do far more beyond all that we could ask or imagine by his power at work within us; glory to him in the church and in Christ Jesus for all generations, forever and always. Amen." (Ephesians 3:20-21, CEB)
