From My Perspective Within The Kingdom

As I sit down to write this article it's been a month and a day since my total left hip replacement surgery on July 19 at Memorial Hospital here in Martinsville. As I reflect on the past month, here are some of my thoughts about my various experiences.

Nothing makes you appreciate good health like poor health. About a week after my surgery, I realized that the pain I had lived with on a daily basis was finally gone and I was pain free at last. I marvel as each new day continues to bring strength to my body.

I give thanks to God for the gift of my healing. And, I am profoundly grateful for the many people - doctors, nurses, aides, and therapists - God used to bring me back to good health. While I have made many pastoral visits at our local hospital and the Stanleytown Heath Care Center over these past 8 1/2 years, I experienced both places from a totally new perspective - as a patient; and I was most impressed with both.

I have always said that I will never preach on patience from the pulpit because I would be a big hypocrite. By nature, I am not a patient person because I am action oriented. But, there are times when we have to be patient because we really don't have a choice in the matter! At times, I had to dig deep within myself to summon forth the necessary patience to simply endure the passage of time while my body healed, slowly but surely. I found that I could be patient when I had to be patient.

What really helped to pass the time were the many visits, cards, and phone calls that I received during my stay at the hospital (3 1/2 days), Stanleytown (2 weeks), and home (2 weeks). I discovered that I am in no danger whatsoever of getting hooked on daytime television! When a familiar face appeared in the doorway, I really perked up as I enjoyed our visit. And, it helped that I love to read; I think I read at least ten books.

At Stanleytown, I made a number of new friends. There was a great deal of camaraderie and support as we shared our pain and cheered on each other as we regained our strength and ability to be more mobile. Although I was there only a short time, we really did experience a sense of community with one another and with our therapists. I look forward to future visits to Stanleytown (as a pastor, not as a patient) to see my friends there and to once again thank the therapists for pushing me to get better quicker.

I want to say a final word about home. It was great to finally come home to see and be with Monica and Laura and our dog, Toby (and, I guess, Laura's cat, Lazlo). Truly, there is no place like home. I have never been in danger of taking my family for granted but I certainly do have new appreciation for Monica and Laura and our home.

And, what a joy it was for me to return to our church home on Sunday, August 8, to be in worship with you. Having felt your prayers and support throughout my time away, I was glad to be in your presence and to let you know that your prayers had been heard and answered. Thank you for the outpouring of your love on my behalf.

Finally, we are never apart from the Lord. We are always and forever at home with the Lord, whether here or there, whether in the hospital, Stanleytown, home, church, or anywhere else. God is present with us and stands beside us to comfort us or strengthen us, to fill us with hope or to give us the peace that passes all understanding, to bless us or to challenge us. Most of all, I am profoundly grateful to God for all that I have experienced within the past month, and I look forward to what's ahead.

Associate Pastor's Column

The combined Adult Sunday School class has been studying the Book of Confessions this summer, starting at the beginning with the Nicene Creed and moving all the way to the most recent confession, A Brief Statement of Faith, which received final approval by the PC(USA) in 1991. This series has been a wonderful opportunity to hear from "the great cloud of witnesses" as the writer of the Book of Hebrews calls it, the voices of the saints in generations that have come before us.

In many and diverse places and times, ordinary people have gathered together to confess, or publicly and corporately declare their faith. We call many of these statements "confessions," a word which sometimes carries negative connotations. We also use the word "confession" to describe our corporate prayer during worship, in which we acknowledge our sin and ask God for forgiveness. I know of churches that have stopped saying unison Prayers of Confession because people thought they were "downers." But I can think of no better action in prayer than to come before God openly and honestly to admit that we are indeed human, and we make mistakes. It is from such a starting point that we are freed, over and over, from the powers of sin and death, and restored to right relationship with God and with one another.

Yet, the act of confession is more than simply admitting our sins through prayer, it is affirming and declaring what we believe to be true. And so, the church over the centuries has gathered together to articulate the heart and depth of our faith. The confessions share many things in common: the unity of one God in three persons, the divinity and humanity of Jesus Christ, the reality of sin, the authority of scripture, and the mission and ministry of the church. But each confession is also delightfully unique, because people authentically spoke in their own specific time and place about how they understood God to be present and working in their lives.

By action of the 219th General Assembly, a new confession has received initial approval to be sent on to the presbyteries for their

vote. It is called the Belhar Confession, and it is not exactly new. It was written in the 1980s in South Africa in the midst of the struggle to end apartheid. I find it a powerful witness to God's reconciliation to a people experiencing alienation and division. Whether or not it ends up in the Book of Confessions, I appreciate its spirit and witness. Also, this opportunity to reflect upon a new confession, has reminded me of the importance of our continual need to articulate our faith. After all, as Presbyterians, we acknowledge we are the "church reformed, always reforming, according to the Word of God." I hope and pray we might always be open to God's Spirit speaking to us, and be ready to respond in faithful witness.

Youth and Children's Music News



Dear Friends,

I am planning a great year of music for all babies, children and youth!! The only thing that I need is......YOUR CHILD'S REGIS-TRATION FORM!!! I really need to know about your children's involvement so that I can finalize our plans. Please call, fax or email me your intentions today.

Fall Schedule is as follows:

The schedule for the fall takes into account that we have children coming from five different school systems, each of which has a different time schedule for dismissal. The city school children are dismissed first, hence the early beginning time. We will have enrichment activities until all children arrive.

Monday: 2:45-4:30 WAM (Worship, Arts and Music) for $1^{st} - 5^{th}$ graders (Singing, drama, playing instruments, handbells/handchimes all combined). I pick up the children from Patrick Henry at 2:45. Others come in as their individual school schedules allow. The children will be grouped by grade and will rotate through an exciting afternoon of music, crafts and games. This is the year we have two plays, so that is always a treat!!

We are going to need significant parental involvement in this group. The work that it takes to put on a Christmas and a Lenten play is enormous and it is simply more than I can handle. If everyone takes on a small responsibility, we have more ownership and no one is overwhelmed.

Tuesday: <u>11:00-11:45</u> <u>Music Together</u> (Early musical experiences for children from birth through 3 years with parent or caregiver) There is a limited number of spaces, so please let me know if you are interested since church members have priority. We will be purchasing at home materials for this group to use at home. There will be 3 quarters - Fall, Winter and Spring and the cost for the materials is \$35 for each quarter. Please make checks out to the church, ear marked for *Music Together*.

<u>12:00-1:30</u> Kindermusik I (Sequential musical experiences I singing, drama, games, and play for 4-year olds. The children bring their lunch and then we have our class together. Parents come at 1:30 for the wrap-up). The fee for church members is \$35. The \$35 covers the child's bag and glockenspiel, but you can borrow them from friends and save yourself some money! The fee for non members is \$150 for the year. Again, if you borrow a bag and glock from someone, your fee is reduced by \$35.

<u>2:45-4:00 Kindermusik II</u>,(Sequential musical experiences in reading, singing multi-cultural music and playing for Kindergartners. The children will learn to play their own dulcimer and recorder). This is a continuation of Kindermusik I, but others who have not had Kindermusik I are welcome. Parents come at 3:55 for the wrap-up time) There is no fee for members, and the non members fee is \$150.

I would like to have a Middle school group. The group can decide if it would like the direction to be handbells, plays, or instrumental. We need six dedicated musicians to make it a go. Day and time would be decided on by the group.

Cantabile Ringers! This is a group for advanced handbell players. We meet on a day that suits the group, usually Sunday after church. This is for 8th graders and up.
