Transition of Pastoral Leadership

At the Called Congregational Meeting on July 14, 2013, the congregation approved a new Terms of Call for Associate Pastor Jenny Spivey. The following highlights are provided by the Clerk of Session, Joan Montgomery.

Congregational Meeting Highlights July 14, 2013 12:05 p.m.

The purpose of the meeting was to present and vote on a new Terms of Call for the Associate Pastor, to take effect the day after the Interim Pastor's departure.

Information was provided to the congregation about the transition period and the change from a Pastor and Associate Pastor to a Solo Pastor.

Questions were received and answered from the congregation about the proposed compensation and a new job description for Jenny as she moves to being the Bridge Pastor until and new Pastor is called.

The congregation approved the new Terms of Call with a unanimous vote. MSP (Motion made, seconded, passed)

At the time of the Congregational Meeting, the date for Joe Reggin's departure had not yet been finalized. Joe's last Sunday was July 28, 2013, and his last day in the office was July 31. Jenny Spivey's first day as "Bridge" Pastor was August 1, 2013. With the approval of both the Session and Presbytery, she will assume the role and function of Pastor for the congregation: preaching and leading worship, administering the sacraments, moderating the Session and serving as acting Head of Staff.

Message from the Outgoing Interim Pastor

By the time you read this I will have left Martinsville, to begin my new position working as an Interim with the congregations of the Synod of Metro Washington DC of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America. I will continue as a Minister of Word and Sacrament with the

Presbyterian Church and will be a member of National Capital Presbytery. I would like you to know that I have enjoyed my time with you and have been especially honored to work with a wonderful staff, dedicated Elders and a highly skilled colleague, your former Associate, now "Bridge," Pastor the Rev. Jenny Spivey. It was also my great pleasure to meet each week with a number of the members of this congregation in various classes of Bible Study. I am especially grateful to those who attended and openly and honestly shared their understanding of our mutual faith in Jesus, as Lord and Savior. As I said in the context of my first sermon here, there is no better way for members of a congregation to become acquainted with a Pastor, and a Pastor with the members, than in the context of the study of Scripture. I have been truly blessed and am grateful for the relationships that have grown with those who participated in our Bible studies.

Even though I have gone, your time of Interim Ministry has not ended. It will continue with the capable leadership of the Elders of your Session, Clerk, Joan Montgomery and your Pastor, Jenny Spivey. The importance of continuing the work of completing the tasks of Interim Ministry, although difficult, is obvious to those who hold leadership positions within this congregation and to many members. This work will be critical to your future relationship with your new Pastor and the programs of ministry and mission you will seek to build and continue with your new Pastor. The difficult reality that congregations face is that, if the interim work is not done in one transition, it will need to be done in another, which will occur in the wake of a failed pastoral relationship and program of ministry and mission. Of course this means there would also be a significant loss of resources, especially time.

I have been asked why I have left my position as Interim Pastor if the work of interim ministry is not complete. I would like to address this question here so that every member has the opportunity to understand what is at stake in the coming months of your transition to new Pastoral Leadership and a new program of mission and ministry with that new Pastor.

When I arrived in April of 2012, your Session had already taken action to reduce the expenses of this congregation by down-sizing your music program, over the objections of some members. I know this decision was difficult for your Elders because those on the music staff were their friends. I saw the struggle many on the Session experienced in the weeks that followed their action. Although this action was difficult, your Session took the most responsible course in regard to their responsibilities as the leaders of this congregation. This action saved tens of thousands of dollars. As a result of these savings, a more secure financial future and a more responsible stewardship of resources may be expected for years to come.

Within a few short months after this change in the budget for the music program, the Stewardship Committee began its work of securing pledges for this year. The projections for the pledges for 2013 showed that even though there were significant cuts in the budget in addition to the cuts in the music staff, there would have to be additional cuts. It is another difficult reality that significant budgets cuts must be made at the point of highest costs for a given organization. Of course this usually means cuts in salaries to paid staff members.

In the first six months of my work with your Session as the Interim, a focus was given to the work and job descriptions of both the Pastor and the Associate Pastor. After several months of study, conversation and prayer, Jenny and I came to the conclusion that there was a high level of redundancy in the work of the Pastor and Associate Pastor. In addition, due to declines in program, membership and resources, the need for two Pastors could no longer be justified.

Once the Stewardship Program had been completed (thanks to the work and dedication of El-

der Lang Mauck and the members of her committee and others within the church who assisted this committee) it became clear that if two Pastors were retained throughout 2013, expenses would over-take income by October 2013. This became one of the focal points of the Session's work during a weekend "retreat" near the end of January of this year. During that weekend the Session heard the report concerning the annual budget and the danger of deficit spending. For a number of reasons the decision was made by the Session, in consultation with me, to explore my leaving by July of this year and having Jenny, as your Associate Pastor, to take over as a "bridge" Pastor. In the context of this plan to cut pastoral staff costs, Jenny was asked to provide pastoral services and leadership to the Session and congregation until a new Pastor could be called. A focus of Jenny's work as the "bridge Pastor" would then be to complete the task of the transition/Interim period with a focus on helping the congregation and Session make the transition from having two Pastors to having one.

I think it is important for me to report that it was clear to all involved in these decisions that this congregation has received many gifts and blessings through the leadership of past Pastors and in the gifts, skills and dedication of Jenny Spivey. This reality seems to have been made especially clear in the wake of the untimely death of your former Pastor, the Rev. Randy Stephens.

As a result of this decision to downsize the Pastoral Staff, the Presbytery was consulted and permission was obtained for Jenny to move once more into the functional role of Pastor of First Church. Since this decision necessitated my leaving as the Interim Pastor, I began seeking a new position in April of this year with the consent and support of the Session and Presbytery.

This means that my leaving is not the result of my wanting to leave. I did not leave because people have been mean to me, or not appreciated my ministry with your congregation. Nor did I leave because I wanted to move to a larger city, or to become a Lutheran. (Although I will work with the Lutherans, I will do so as a Presbyterian!) I am leaving for one reason and one reason only; this being that after much prayer, study, discussion, thought and care, your Session reached the conclusion, as it did in regard to the music staff, that additional cuts needed to be made and, as the Interim on this field of ministry, I was the most expendable staff member. It was then and is now also true that because I am an Interim Consultant/Pastor my finding a new position and moving would have a small impact on me, as opposed to Jenny, especially since she and Clint had just provided Gwendolyn with a new baby sister!

My leaving this congregation would have been difficult for me under the best of circumstances. I enjoyed my time with you. My difficulty in leaving was increased; however, because I will not be here to continue the vital work that is needed in the remainder of the time of your transition to a new Pastor. That will be left in the capable hands of others. In addition, I will not be with you to celebrate the call of your new Pastor and the new era of ministry that will begin with your new Pastor's installation. I will also not be here to continue our Bible Studies, the training of Elders and the sharing of the Word and Sacraments in worship. I will also not be here to enjoy the fellowship shared in my many encounters with members, visitors and friends of this congregation. For me it was difficult to leave; however, knowing that you can now move forward without the anxiety of deficits, knowing that you have a competent, capable and caring Pastor and knowing that you have dedicated leaders who accept the difficult work and the heavy responsibilities they have been called to take upon themselves in this interim period, greatly lessens my difficulty and transforms any sadness I have had in this parting into a genuine joy and hope regarding your future. So, with this letter, I leave you with a quote from Marge Dunn, "I will not say goodbye, only see you later!" May you be well as individuals, as families and as a family of faith. May God's blessings be with you and reside with you now and always - Joe

From the Music Department



Thank you to all who voted for their favorite hymns for our special favorite hymn emphasis at the 11:00 a.m. service during July. There was a huge diversity of fa-

vorites and we will continue into August with the singing of more of them in order to cover the top twenty-two. There was a four-way tie for the last two places in the top-twenty list. Almost every hymn sung during the month of July was voted a favorite.

As you may recall, each person's number one favorite hymn received three points, their second choice received two points, and their third choice received one point. There were 34 more hymns that received a few votes.



The maker of the shawl prays before, during, and after working on the shawl. Shawls are presented during the church's worship service and the congregation prays for the person receiving the shawl. Shawls are delivered to recipients with a tag saying:

This shawl was knitted for you by a member of the congregation of First Presbyterian Church Martinsville. The shawl represents the love we have for you and the hope that it offers. We ask that you wrap it around you knowing that the congregation prayed for you and dedicated this shawl as a symbol of God's love for you and the love of our church.

Did You Know?.....



Did you know that "one of our own" is currently in medical school in South Carolina AND recently returned from a mission trip to North Africa?

Jennifer Stanley, daughter of Patsy Stanley and her late husband, Barry, spent part of her early years here before Barry's job with DuPont sent him and his family to other places. When Barry died in 2005, Patsy returned to Henry County and we once again established contact with Jennifer.

After graduating with Honors from the Honors College of Clemson University, Jennifer spent two years in East Asia with Campus Crusade, through Clemson. She continued to take classes while there and when she returned, spent a year readjusting and preparing to take the MedCAT and working on applications to medical schools.

She was accepted to the Medical University of South Carolina in Charleston and began classes there last fall. Completing her first year in May, she was given the opportunity to go to North Africa with Medical Campus Outreach.

Our church was able to help her with prayer and financial support as she and her team, composed of both students and professionals, saw approximately 1200 people in just two short weeks there. People came from the town where the clinic was located and from surrounding mountain areas with many and varied complaints.

From her letter to the Mission Committee upon her return, Jennifer says, "While we were selective in overtly sharing the Gospel and our faith with our patients for security reasons, by being Americans it was assumed that we were Christians, which we used to our advantage. We were able to share Christ's love with our patients simply by treating them with love and respect...The Lord used my team to meet tangible needs of the people of North Africa and to bring glory to His name, and I thank you for joining with me to be a part of it all."

We hope to continue our relationship with this remarkable young woman as she visits her mother this summer and on subsequent vacations here.
