FROM THE INTERIM PASTOR: Session Highlights

August 27, 2012

- Joe Reggin, Moderator, opened the meeting with prayer.
- The Session voted to forgo the usual agenda in favor of an agenda that provided a model for future meetings, using the concepts of Bowen Theory as a paradigm for Session leadership.
- Ann Reaser and Duke Ferrell were appointed to attend the installation of Bradley Long as pastor of Forest Hills Presbyterian on August 12, 2012.
- A policy for voting by email was approved.
- The Session approved the Mission Committee's request to apply for a 2cents-a-Meal grant to assist with the monthly Community Breakfast.
- A Family Leave request by Jenny was approved for eight weeks, per the Presbytery Family Leave Guidelines, to begin at her discretion.
- A motion was approved, on second read, to take \$12,000 from the Capital Endowment Fund to replace air conditioning units in 3 areas of the church that are currently used by staff.
- The concept of self-differentiation was introduced to the Session by the Moderator as a self-help that is integral to positive leadership. On the basis of discussion by the elders in the context of this model the following actions were approved per majority vote:
 - 1) The Session approved the adoption of the use of Bowen Theory as a paradigm for leadership within the Session.
 - 2) The Session approved the reduction of the number of elders from 18 to 9.
 - 3) The rotation of elders on a program schedule (serving September to September rather than

- 7) January to January) was approved.
- 8) The Session accepted, with gratitude for their service, the resignations of elders Nancy Davis, Harold Lamm, Joan Montgomery, Lynn Pritchett, and Ann Reaser effective at the adjournment of the meeting.
- 9) A Called Meeting of the Session is scheduled for Saturday, Sept. 15 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. to work on issues related to the work of the Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC), the writing of a Church Information Form (CIF) and the task of calling a Pastor.
- The meeting was closed with prayer.

When my wife and I lived as newlyweds in Toledo, Ohio, we awoke daily to soft music on our radio alarm.

One day a perfectly-timed commercial aroused us. It went like this: "GOOD MORNING AMERICA! MCDONALDS IS FIXING BREAKFAST FOR YOU!

And as a sleepy-headed teenager, my days started with two words from my mama. "GET UP."

With amazing regularity the scriptures are filled with the words, "Get Up."

"Get up, take your mat and go home," Jesus said to the paralyzed man.

"Get up and pray," Jesus complained to sleeping disciples.

Looking over this congregation, I see the Smith and Gael Chaneys and the Marge Dunns. And we all remember Randy Stevens, Jim Baker, Dr. Irby and other saints who answered the call to "GET UP."

But today our church isn't healthy. The rolls are dwindling. We have made painful staff cuts, eliminated programs and dipped into our endowment reserves.

A few days ago I read about a church growth specialist. He was asked to diagnose declining membership in a certain church. After attending church for several weeks, he met with the church board of elders. Here is what he said – PUT A FENCE AROUND THE CHURCH. THEN CHARGE ADMISSION SO PEOPLE CAN COME AND SEE HOW CHURCH WAS DONE IN THE 1950s.

In other words, he was saying the church was "Hopelessly Behind." So, where do we go from here? Do we want to be God's chosen Presbyterians, or God's frozen Presbyterians? Are we just putting a positive spin on things and ignoring evidence to the contrary. Attempting to make progress while turning a blind eye to reality is like treading water. Eventually you drown. I don't think we want to put a fence around our church. And we certainly don't want to charge admission.

I remember hearing brother Mark Mason's suggestion at a recent Stewardship Committee

meeting. "The only way our church is going to survive," he said, "is to bring more members into the church." I couldn't agree more. I will simply add to that these words!!!!!

"Get Up! Get up when you see a newcomer in our church, shake their hand and give 'em a welcome. Get up! Get up and invite a neighbor, friend, or new person on the block to visit our wonderful church. Be friendly with one another. Show some spirit! Get Up! Get UP! Get Up!

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

I felt compelled to write this letter, not as the wife of the former pastor but as a church member who loves this congregation and who has had some experience with pain. Whether we acknowledge it or not, we are a church in pain. Many of us still feel the pain of grief and loss due to Randy's death. Many of us feel the pain of uncertainty about what the future holds for our congregation. Many feel the pain of change that has come unbidden and, in some instances, unwelcomed. Many of us are feeling the burden and pain of new responsibilities that are falling square on the shoulders of our congregation members and especially on session members.

Pain is a natural response to unpleasant life-changing events. The purpose of biological pain is to move us into positive action away from the source of the pain and into a situation more conducive to preserving and sustaining life. When the warning of pain is heeded, pain becomes a blessing. However, pain can also cause us to become immobile – stuck in a frame of mind that does not allow healing and wholeness. Severe pain can drive a person to do things they would never do if they were in their right minds. Unrelenting physical pain can cause a person to shut down vital functions one by one until life cannot be sustained and he/she dies.

We are at a crossroads as a congregation. There is much that is good and wonderful in our life together as a church and in our mission to the larger world. There is much that is vital, healthy, and life-giving in this congregation. On the other hand, our pain is getting in our way. Instead of sharing our concerns in a mutually respectful dialogue, we have become contentious, or even worse, silent. Instead of coming closer together in our hour of need, we are pulling away, becoming fragmented. Instead of hearing one another out with an open

mind, we have become entrenched in our own perspectives. Instead of throwing our arms around each other with the love of Christ, we turn our backs.

We are at a crossroads. Will we acknowledge our pain and allow it to motivate us toward positive action, or will we become stuck and allow our pain to destroy us? At the time of Randy's death, several people referred to Randy's death as a tragedy. It certainly isn't for him. He is face to face with the Lord whom he has loved and served all of his life. As much as our family misses Randy and feels his loss daily, his death was not a tragedy for us. We were blessed to share our lives with him and still carry much of him with us. When we get together, his loss, but also his presence, is multiplied among us. How will be it with this congregation? Will Randy's untimely death cause tragedy for this church, or will it be the stimulus that moves us into positive action? Will we remember that the Christ who lived for us, died for us, and continues to live with us has called us together to be his Body? Will we pray for his Spirit to infuse all that we do so that we can overcome our pain and our difficulties? Will we move forward from our pain into the new life that God, through Christ and with the strength of the Holy Spirit, wants to unfold for us? The choice is ours. I pray that we choose life.

What are Prayer Shawls?

The purpose of a Prayer Shawl is to give some-



one a tangible example of God's love and care. The shawl is made of soft yarn so the recipient can wrap in it and feel God's arms around him or her. A Prayer Shawl is made with prayer. The maker of the

shawl prays before, during, and after working on the shawl. Shawls will be presented during the church's worship service and the congregation will pray for the person receiving the shawl. Shawls will be delivered to recipients informing them that the shawl is from the congregation of First Presbyterian Church.

How will the Prayer Shawl Ministry begin at FPC?

- •The Session approved this ministry through the Worship Committee;
- •Monthly meetings will be a time to share tips, to teach, and help new knitters or those who are learning to crochet, and to enjoy fellowship. If persons are unable to attend, shawls may be made in the comfort of homes and brought to the group for dedication
- •Shawls will be presented at a worship service by the knitters or a representative of the group.
- •All congregation members may take part in the ministry by actually making Prayer Shqawls or by making monetary donations to purchase yarn and supplies.
