From My Perspective Within The Kingdom

One day last month, I went on a hike with my son, Dan, and my brother-inlaw, Karl. We were doing an eight-mile hike that begins at the Rocky Knob overlook off of the Blue Ridge Parkway; we would walk west a bit and then turn and go down the mountain to the Rock Castle Gorge trail's starting point. Karl and I rode in my car and Dan followed behind in Monica's car. We parked Monica's car at the bottom of the hill: then Dan got into my car and we drove to the top of the mountain and parked my car at Rocky Knob. Afterwards, we would end up at Monica's car and drive her car back up the mountain to pick up my car and head home. At least that's the way it was supposed to work but it didn't!

About two hours into the hike, I discovered that when Dan had given me Monica's car keys, instead of putting them in my pocket, I absentmindedly put them in the pouch of the driver's side door in my car. Thus, it dawned on me that we had no way of opening her car and driving back up the mountain to get my car! I shared this disturbing news with Dan and Karl, and I told them I would hitchhike back to my car; fortunately, when I discovered the key was missing, the hiking trail was about forty yards off of the Blue Ridge Parkway. They voted against me and said we shouldn't split up. Dan, who is an experienced hiker, felt that he should hike back and get the keys out of my car, but I countered that that would take a good two hours. Due to my stubbornness and strong sense of responsibility (after all, I was the one who forgot Monica's car key in the first place!), I said I would hitchhike and I did. Five or six cars

passed by without even slowing down; and one of those cars was a taxicab with a passenger inside.

After about ten minutes, the taxi cab driver reappeared after dropping off his fare. I explained our predicament to him and he said he would take me back to my car. Ten minutes later, I had rejoined Dan and Karl with both sets of car keys in hand! I asked the taxi cab driver what I owed him and he said ten dollars. I had several twenties on me and I gave him one of them saying, "How about a twenty; it's worth the extra money for me that you stopped and gave me a ride." He was fine with that arrangement. Then I said to him, "Sir, I'll bet you didn't realize that you were going to be the answer to someone's prayer today, did you?" "No," he said, "I sure didn't." "Well, you are! I sure do appreciate your help!" I got out of his car and the hike continued. All in all, we were only off of the trail less than a half hour.

I've told that story to several friends and they have responded by saying that, in all of their years on the parkway, they have never seen a taxi cab up there. Some might call it luck, fate, chance, happenstance, or coincidence. But, I am too biased in my thinking. I know that it was divine providence! God was looking out for me and providing a way to deal with the situation at hand. I continue to be amazed it never gets old! at how God takes care of us and provides for us. I have one more reason for which to be thankful and pour out my gratitude to the Lord.

I hope this story will "prime the pump" and cause you to remember those certain times in your life when the Lord provided for you as well. If so, please tell me your story, as I would love to hear it. As I have been thinking of this celebration, I have been reading back through Jim Stegall's excellent book Grace Upon Grace, both laughing at some good stories and feeling inspired by the amazing kindness members of this congregation have shown to one another and to this community. This church has so much to be proud of, especially of how we have nurtured so many people in the faith throughout the years. I hope this Coming Home Weekend will be an opportunity to cherish where we have been and also to look forward at all the wonderful things I believe God has in store for this congregation.
