From My Perspective Within The Kingdom

The thermometer reads in the 90's and there are plenty of baseball games on TV, so it must be summertime! And, with that in mind, I am reminded of a story entitled *Modern Parable* by Ray Montgomery. It goes like this:

Behold, a ball team went forth to play a game of baseball. Just as the umpire was saying "Batter up," the catcher for the home team arrived and took his place. The center fielder didn't show up at all but later sent his regrets. The third baseman, likewise, failed to come to the game, having been up late the night before. The shortstop was present but left his glove at home. Two of the substitute fielders were away on a little weekend trip, but were there in spirit.

Verily, when the pitcher went to the mound he looked around for his teammates and lo, his heart was heavy, for their places were empty. But the game was announced and the visitors were in the stands and there was nothing to do but to pitch the ball and hope for the best. But he had to serve as pitcher, first baseman, third baseman, and cover short and center field. When the absent members of the defeated team heard that their team had lost, a decision was made to get a new pitcher!

The obvious lesson is that it takes all of the baseball players to be present and play their assigned positions in order to make the team function at its very best. If the team has a chance to win, it will take the concerted effort of every baseball player showing up and doing his very best so that the team can come together and play at its highest level.

What's true of a baseball team is equally true for a congregation. Everyone is needed to do her or his part so that the congregation can be at its very best in service to God and the community. We see glimpses of this truth in the midst of our life together.

As I am writing this article, our church is hosting the Vacation Bible School, along with four other area churches. I have marveled time and again at this first-class venture of faith because so many people have worked hard and long in prior months to bring this program together. Since I have a hard time even drawing stick figures, I admire and appreciate those who have designed, made, and painted the various scenes and figures around the church to fit the theme of *Pandemania – where God is wild about you!* Others have participated by leading the opening exercises, teaching in the various classrooms, coordinating fun, recreational activities, serving up delicious snacks, and so on. There are lots and lots of children along with youth and adult workers. It is absolutely wonderful to see the various parts that make up the whole, the many people that work together to make this time another successful, fun, and meaningful Vacation Bible School. I am proud of our many church members (of all ages), along with our friends from the other churches and the community, who have made this VBS into a very special week for all.

I am also grateful for the many people, who serve on the Session or one of its committees (or sub-committees, task forces or ad hoc groups). I give thanks to God for each and every one of you.

Associate Pastor's Column

In worship on Sunday, June 26, twenty-two youth and adults were commissioned and sent forth to share in God's mission in Charlotte, NC. Once we arrived in Charlotte, we were welcomed into our home for the week, at Avondale Presbyterian Church's Family Life Center. host, Associate Pastor Brad Clayton (and a college friend of mine), provided an orientation and talked about how God's mission is indeed lived out not only by helping people with our hands and energy, but also shared by simply being a friend, and assuring people that they are valued and loved children of God. On Monday, the group spent time at Crisis Assistance of Charlotte, helping sort through and hang up donated clothes that would be made available as part of a free clothes closet for those in In the afternoon on Monday and throughout the week, our group helped lead games and activities with the children and youth attending the Freedom School, which was also located at the Avondale church. The Freedom School is a summer enrichment program that focuses on reading and learning skills for at-risk students, to provide them an opportunity to perform better in school. On Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, we broke into smaller teams which did a variety of service projects such as yard work, painting, house maintenance, and hauling bricks from the foundation of a burned home. One of the most meaningful projects of the week was cleaning, painting and helping out an elderly woman named Rosita. She suffered from macular degeneration, and was nearly blind, and therefore needed a lot of assistance around her house. Our group painted, cleaned the siding, did yard work, and replaced some faulty plumbing. Rosita loved to talk to us, and shared stories about her family, and her life; she was a model in her youth, and became a teacher and professor of chemistry as an adult. Each day the group came, she gathered us together to express her appreciation to us, and give thanks to God for sending us to her. Her faith and life inspired us all. On Tuesday and Thursday evenings, we participated with members of Avondale's Mission committee and volunteers in preparing and delivering bag meals to the homeless. This is a ministry their church has done twice a week, all year long, for over five years. Some who came were indeed homeless, and some just really needed a meal that night. When we got off the bus to deliver meals, we didn't just drop off meals and leave, but everyone talked with one another. It was clear that Lynn and other church members had built relationships with them, they knew and trusted each other.

Thoughout the week there was another, though perhaps unstated, mission going on – and that was building community and friendships with each other as a mission group. Every day each smaller team helped by taking turns preparing meals for the whole group and leading evening devotions. We reflected on our experiences and gave thanks to God for the ways we each had seen the face of Christ in those we encountered that day. On the last evening we took time to think about how this experience had changed us, and how we could share that with our families and friends back home. We hope to share our experiences in many ways with our church family - picture displays, sharing in worship, and possibly new ideas for mission at home! But, too, ask us -take time to greet some of the young people on Sunday morning and hear what they have to share. Many thanks to the church family for all your support of this trip!

The 2006 General Assembly granted authorization for the Presbyterian Publishing Corporation to research, develop, and produce a new hymnal. In every generation we are called to claim our song and bear witness to what God is doing in the world. A hymnal is very much like a family album which gives insight into our faith throughout the generations.

Since 2008 the process has been under way in partnership with the Office of Theology, Worship, and Education and the

Presbyterian Association of Musicians. The final content list for the new resource will include many hymns and songs that have been part of the song of the church for generations. You can learn more about the project on the web site,

www.presbyterianhymnal.org. A complete list of contents will be presented to the 2012 General Assembly in Pittsburgh.

This new collection of congregational song will give us an opportunity to make available a great wealth of hymns and spiritual songs that have arisen since the 1990 hymnal, to acquaint worshipers with wonderful resources from Christian communities around the world, and to review again the great heritage of congregational songs that has been passed on to us from past generations of faithful worshipers.

The Society of St. Andrew's program Harvest of Hope sponsors several Intergenerational Weekends for participants of all ages to come and learn about hunger, and give their time and energy gleaning fields to collect food to donate to local feeding agencies. Youth and Children's Music

Summer is still kicking but I am fully charged for Fall. Our classes are fun and exciting and I want as many of you involved as possible. Please share with friends and neighbors. All classes are open to our friends, members or not.

Here is the schedule:

Monday: 2:45-4:30 WAM(worship, arts, music) for 1st through 5th graders. This is a wonderful group that plays handbells, recorders (new this year), prepares two plays, sings, and learns about worship and its' meaning. We play together, create art and follow our faith journey as well.

Note: I desperately need another adult to help. This is a large group and our teens are great, but, because of their school schedules, they cannot be present until later in the afternoon. Would you consider coming for a few weeks? Musical ability is not a prerequisite, just someone who loves children!

There is a 20 dollar refreshment fee (per child) for this group.

Tuesday: 11:00 Music Together for children age birth to 3 and a half years old or so. This is a nationally revered program of musical experiences for a child and an adult. We sing, dance, play and grow musically together. The fee for this is \$35 per quarter for a set of beautiful materials including two CDs and a beautiful book. Noon: Kindermusik I This is another nationally known program that is for the 4-5 year old. This is my 22nd year teaching this curriculum that is perfect for every child. We learn to play a glockenspiel, read notes, play wonderful games and grow musically. We begin at noon with a packed lunch and finish at 1:30

2:45-4:00 Kindermusik II This is the continuation of Kindermusik I. This year we study the music of the world. We make and learn to play a dulcimer and learn to be proficient on recorder. By the time children have finished Kindermusik, they have had experience on a string instrument,

woodwind and percussion. It really sets them up for wherever their musical road leads. The children come from three school systems at different times, and we do enrichment til everyone arrives. The fee for members is \$35 and for non members \$150 for the year.

Middle and High School Handbells-Come one, come all, no experience necessary! This is a great group that has a blast making super music and playing together. We practice after church a few Sundays a month and try to play in church about once every six weeks. We had a great group last year and I am sure this year will be the very same!

All groups will begin after Labor Day, the Tuesday groups beginning on September 6th and the first WAM meeting on September 12th.

Early registration is certainly appreciated!!
