From My Perspective Within The Kingdom

During our first year of marriage, Monica and I were invited to have dinner with a couple and their two small children at their home. We went and spent a delightful evening with this family, who belonged to the Trinity Presbyterian Church in Austin, TX that I attended and served all three years I was in seminary. The food was delicious and the conversation around the table was both rich and warm. As we were headed out the door, I said, "This has been such a wonderful time. How can we ever repay you?" The husband's response went like this: "When Nancy and I were newly married, a couple invited us over to dinner and we enjoyed our time with them very much. We too asked how we could ever repay them and they said we could repay them by doing this same thing for someone else and so we have." He went on to say, "If you want, you can repay us by inviting others into your home and sharing Christian friendship with them. "With those gracious words still ringing in our ears thirty-two-plus vears later, Monica and I (and our children) would like to invite our church family, friends, and neighbors to our home on Friday, December 28, for an Open House from 3:00-7:00 p.m. This will be our third Open House in the six years we have lived here in Martinsville, and we are really looking forward to sharing good home-cooked food, laughter, and joy with many others. We have been so richly blessed and, in turn, we want to share our home with others lots of others! Please be sure to write this down on your calendar right away: Friday, December 28th, 3:00-7:00 p.m., Open House at the Stevens' home at 104

Courtney Terrace in Martinsville. Here are the directions: come down Sam Lions Trail from Mulberry, go around Lake Lanier to the left, pass by Hunting Ridge on the left, and when Sam Lions Trail makes a right hand turn it becomes Country Club Drive; Courtney Terrace is the only cul de sac on the right, and we are the first house on the right. We hope you will help us "repay" our friends in Austin, Texas, by coming to our home and sharing in our joy and gratitude for your friendship. Please, please just bring yourselves (no gifts!). As we anticipate this festive gathering with our church family and other friends in the community, I am especially mindful of the Prologue in John's Gospel. St. John uses beautiful, poetic language to describe the incarnation (God taking on human flesh) in the person of Jesus. In John 1:14 we read that "the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory of a father's only son, full of grace and truth (NRSV). The KJV states "the Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us." Someone has suggested that another rendering would be that God took on human flesh and "pitched his tent right alongside of ours." And, Eugene Peterson, in The Message, proclaims, "The Word became flesh and blood, and moved into the neighborhood." At any rate, Jesus came to be with us, to make his home with us, in order that he could bring us home to God. Thus, it seems highly appropriate that we open our home to you and share in joyous fellowship in Jesus' name and for his sake.

May you and yours have a blessed spiritual journey through Advent and Christmas. And, don't forget the Stevens' family will be looking for you to show up at our house and share the

warmth, laughter, and good eats of our home on Friday, December 28. In Christ's love, Randy

A Word from the Associate Pastor:

In September, I shared with you my hope that our congregation could focus on prayer, Bible study, and fellowship over the next year. As we are moving into Advent, now is the perfect time to make a renewed commitment, especially to prayer and Bible study. The word Advent originates from the Latin word for coming. Advent is a season of preparation for the Christ child. This time of year, we adorn our houses with beautiful decorations. We sing along to the beloved Christmas carols that are played on the radio. I also invite us to tend our own souls, and to remember the "Reason for the Season."

It is intimidating to many of us to think about becoming more engaged in our devotional life. How do we do it? How do we structure our time in our already busy lives to create space to encounter the Almighty? There is a practical step that I invite you to consider. It is a baby step that has the possibility for a big payoff. Within this edition of Steepleviews, you will find our Advent Devotional Guide. This is the third straight year that Randy and I have worked on putting together this guide for your use during Advent. Each day, the guide highlights a particular ministry of our church, a way in which our members are putting their faith in Christ into action. making this community and this world a better place. As I look over the list, it inspires me to see how much good we are accomplishing as partners together. There is also a Scripture reading assigned for each day.

Advent is 24 days this year. I invite you to put the Advent Devotional Guide in some quiet spot in your home. Keep the

guide in the same location. Place a candle there. Light the candle, as a symbol for the light of Christ. Then pray briefly for God to grant you the gift of the Holy Spirit. Next, read the Scripture lesson assigned for the day. As you read the passage, ask yourself: what is God communicating to me through this holy text? Finally read the daily prayer and pray for the individual or group listed; also please lift up to God any of your own personal prayer requests.

My suggestions are very concrete and specific, not because this is the one and only right way to read the devotional use this Advent Guide that works better for you, please do so. If you have another devotional practice that is meaningful to you that does not involve this guide, more power to you. My ultimate goal in this article is to encourage each of us to find ways to connect with our Almighty, alive, ever-present Lord. I am have been specific to offer you one model, one place to start.

The steps I suggest should take less than 15 minutes per day. I am tempted to try to convince you to do this by saving how little time it will take, but I do not think that is the right approach. We should not simply look to give God our leftovers. Several previous occasions during Lent and Advent, I have committed myself to a daily devotional. It has not always been easy to keep up, but in the end, I have always felt that God has accomplished something significant through my willingness to carve out a space to listen for God. So this Advent, I ask you to prepare for the coming of our Lord by making a good investment of your time through prayer and Bible study. Peace in Christ,
