# From My Perspective Within The Kingdom

I want to begin by telling a story I heard some time ago. Two students met in seminary and became close friends. They shared many classes and many late night sessions together. At graduation they went their separate ways. One felt called by God to do small church ministry while the other went to a good size church. Over the years, they kept in touch by monthly church newsletters, occasional phone calls, and the traditional Christmas letter to family and friends. They both went back to their seminary for their twentieth class reunion. The one minister told of the small churches he had served within that time period. Then, he asked his friend to bring him up to date on his current church situation. The other minister humbly acknowledged that he was now in a church with well over one thousand members on the rolls and an average of seven hundred people in worship each Sunday. His friend responded, "Wow, seven hundred people in worship on a Sunday! Imagine that! How do you preach to that many people and please them all?" His friend replied, "I don't! I don't preach to please all seven hundred people. I only preach to please just One and that's the Lord!"

That story really speaks to me because it reminds us all in a very vivid way that ultimately we really only need to be concerned with pleasing One. We are accountable and answerable, most of all, to Jesus Christ concerning our thoughts, our decisions, our words, and our actions. Sometimes we are pulled in two or more ways trying to please a lot of different people with varying opinions; and, sometimes it is difficult ,if not impossible, to be all things to all people. While this is true for each one of us as individual Christians, it is equally true for a body of Christians. For instance, when the twenty-four elders and two pastors of the Session gather to make decisions, we don't strive to get our own way or to represent a certain interest group in the congregation. Rather, we "seek together to find and represent the will of Christ" (Book of Order, G-4.0301d). That's what matters the most!

I would like to suggest that, as we approach the new year, we strive to make and keep only one New Year's resolution before and above all others we might make about eating, exercising or spending habits or whatever else you have in mind. Let us strive to be and do our very best to please our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ with our daily lives and our faithful witness. Let this goal be our guiding light for which we aim each day, each week, each month throughout 2008. And, when we do our best to please Christ Jesus, we have the assurance that our lives of compassion, integrity, and service are pleasing in the sight of the Lord. A Word from the Associate Pastor:

At the congregation's Annual Meeting in September, I shared with you my three goals for First Presbyterian Church of Martinsville in 2007-2008. I formulated these goals after listening to you: both to the things you care about and to the ways you hope to grow. The three goals are that we, as a congregation over the next year, will focus on (1.) prayer, (2.) fellowship, and (3.) encountering the Bible. In recent newsletter articles, I have discussed how we can become more disciplined in our devotional life by taking practical steps to improve our prayer life and our time studying the Bible.

In this month's article, I will be focusing on fellowship. This congregation is full of genuine and fun people, folks who enjoy spending time together. As a Christian community, fellowship is about having fun together, but it is also about much more than that. Jesus promised in Matthew 18:20, "Wherever two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them." I truly believe that as Christians gather together, sharing joys, hopes, concerns, and faith with one another, Jesus is really present with us. M. Scott Peck tells a powerful tale, "The Rabbi's Gift," at the beginning of his book The Different Drum. A monastery that had once thrived was dying and had been reduced to five elderly monks. The abbot is troubled by the decline of the monastery and decides to go to the woods to pray. He finds a rabbi there and the abbot asks him for advice. The rabbi's only words are, "One of you is the Messiah."

Returning to the monastery, the abbot shares this advice with the other four monks. None of them believe it at first: they know each other's faults too well! Yet they were curious about the advice, so they started looking more closely, just in the slight chance the rabbi was right. The strange thing was that they developed a profound respect for each other, which began to attract new visitors to the dying monastery. That place started growing and became vibrant as a positive spirit infused the monastery. Think of all the wonderful things that can happen if we expect that we can meet Jesus in our neighbors. Rather than focusing on each other's flaws, we can reap the benefits if we appreciate the good that each person offers.

From my conversations with you, I sense that many of you would like to have more opportunities for informal conversation and interaction with each other. So in response, the Worship Committee has begun to organize two events during 2008 that will allow us to grow as Christian friends, who share mutual affection and laughter.

First, our church has reserved Camp Hat Creek for a **Church-Wide Retreat** on April 4-6, 2008. That weekend, the entire church family, from two to ninetytwo, is invited to join us. Whether you are a single person or a married couple, a youth or a preschooler, an empty nester or a retiree, we hope you will plan to attend. It will be a weekend of relaxation, campfires, beautiful scenery, good food, worship, and great conversations. Save the date! There will be more information about the retreat in the weeks to come.

Second, we are planning a Homecoming in the fall of 2008. Many churches have a **Homecoming**, a time when its former friends and members are invited to come back for worship and other festivities. We thought it was about time for our church to have such a celebration. If you are interested in helping plan either event, please contact: Betsy Haskins (for the homecoming), Bill Peterson, (for the retreat), or me.
