From My Perspective Within The Kingdom

Giacomo Puccini was an Italian operatic composer, who wrote such works as Madame Butterfly, La Boheme, and La Tosca. In 1922 Puccini was stricken with cancer and decided to write one more opera entitled Turandot. "But suppose you die?" remarked his students. "Oh," Puccini responded, "my disciples will finish it."

In 1924 Puccini died, and his disciples did indeed finish his opera. The premiere took place in Milan, Italy at La Scala Opera House, under the baton of Puccini's best student, Arturo Toscanini. The performance proceeded to that point where Puccini had abruptly ended. Toscanini paused and remarked to the audience, Thus far, the master wrote and then the master died. Toscanini then picked up the baton and shouted out to the audience, But his disciples finished his music.

That story resonates with our own experience as rooted in Christ Jesus. Although our Master died (yet, was raised from the dead and ascended into heaven!), Christ Jesus expects his disciples to finish the work he began while here on earth. His task was to seek and to do the Father's will, and that job description is now laid upon our shoulders.

In the Book of Order of our Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), we read that The Church of Jesus Christ is the provisional demonstration of what God intends for all humanity. The Church is called to be a sign in and for the world of the new reality which God has made available to people in Jesus Christ. The new reality revealed in Jesus Christ is the new humanity, a new creation, a new beginning for human life in the world: sin is for

given; reconciliation is accomplished; the dividing walls of hostility are torn down. The Church is the body of Christ, both in its corporate life and in the lives of its individual members, and is called give shape and substance to this truth. (G-3.0200)

Thus far, the Master wrote, spoke, and served. Now, by the guidance of the Holy Spirit, as disciples of the living Christ, we strive to finish the music that he set in motion. We are intentional about carrying on our Lord Jesus ministry of love and reconciliation. Someone has said, that we are called to be the hands and feet of Christ as we take the Gospel and share it in the world.

It is highly significant that, in the very same month we celebrate Thanksgiving, we also emphasize stewardship. We not only reflect on all of the blessings we have received from the Lord, we also respond with gratitude and strive to give as we have received. As we move towards New Consecration Sunday on November 11, and from there build a faith-based budget for 2008, let us be ever mindful of our Master's work. And then, let us do our part as his disciples to finish or, at least continue his work in this community to the best of our ability. Working, serving, and giving together, in the name of our Lord Jesus, we can accomplish a great deal for the kingdom of God in 2008.

We have a God-given opportunity set before us to do our part to further Christ's ministry. May our response echo Isaiah's own words: "Here am I; send me!" (Isa. 6:8) In Christ's love, Randy

Word from the Associate Pastor:

November has now arrived: the holiday season is upon us. It is time to put away our Jack-o-Lanterns and Halloween costumes. Soon we will be barraged with advertisements telling us how we need to stuff our stockings with their new products. This month, of course, we will be celebrating Thanksgiving.

Did you know when Thanksgiving officially began? In elementary school, all of us heard about how the Pilgrims celebrated a time of thanksgiving when they first entered the new world. But did you know that Thanksgiving was not an officially recognized national holiday until 1863?

Abraham Lincoln established the holiday in the middle of the Civil War, which was perhaps the darkest hour in the history of our entire nation. What a bold, daring move! Lincoln reminded our country of gratitude at a time when we, as a nation, were bitterly divided. Here is a portion of Lincoln's touching Thanksgiving Proclamation of 1863: "We have been the recipients of the choisest bounties of heaven; we have been preserved these many years in peace and prosperity; we have grown in numbers, wealth and power as no other nation has ever grown. But we have forgotten God. We have forgotten the gracious hand, which preserved us in peace and multiplied and enriched and strengthened us, and we have vainly imagined, in the deceitfulness of our hearts, that all these blessings were produced by some superior wisdom and virtue of our own. Intoxicated with unbroken success, we have become too self-sufficient to feel the necessity of redeeming and preserving grace, too proud to pray to the God that made us. It has seemed to me fit and proper that God should be solemnly, reverently

and gratefully acknowledged, as with one heart and one voice, by the whole American people. I do therefore invite my fellow citizens in every part of the United States, and also those who are at sea and those who are sojourning in foreign lands, to set apart and observe the last Thursday of November as a day of Thanksgiving and praise to our beneficent Father Who dwells in the heavens."

It makes me proud to see how Lincoln faced adversity with courage and conviction. In Lincoln's day, it would have been easy to give in to despair amidst all the challenges our nation faced, but he chose instead to remain positive. We face our own challenges today. The economy of this community is facing a downturn. The war in Iraq continues, and peace and stability remain elusive. People are more over scheduled than ever, feeling pulled in too many directions. Unfortunately God often takes a back seat in our over scheduled lives. I think if we, like Lincoln, look to God for our many blessings, our perspective on life will be properly balanced. There are indeed many reasons for offering praise to our Lord. Thanks be to God! Peace in Christ,

- The most important part of parenting is role modeling, and Sunday School is a good start.
- Don't ask your children if they want to come to SS. Make it a family tradition that everyone comes. You'll be glad you did.

This advice is given by parents with 25+ years of experience in parenting--advice given from failures and successes.
