From My Perspective Within The Kingdom

The prolific author, Dr. John Killinger, who has written over fifty books, tells the following story on himself. "When I was twelve or thirteen, I began spending a lot of time wandering the fields and creeks where I grew up, thinking about God and trying to love God with my small heart. I was often frustrated because there was so little I seemed to be able to do for God. I had almost no money. I didn't have a very good education. I had no influence of any kind. I wasn't even an athlete, so that I could bear witness in that way. I was just a poor boy who loved God.

Years later, when I was a pastor and had a lot of influence in the community and had written a number of books, I was praying about my life and what I should do with it. I tried to empty my mind and then to set it out like a bowl to receive the impressions God's Spirit wanted me to have. And you know what I heard God say, 'I want my little boy back again. Not the man who had been a teacher. Not the man who was pastor of a big church. Not the man who had friends and

who had been a teacher. Not the man who was pastor of a big church. Not the man who had friends and influence across the country. Not the man who had written all those books.' God's little boy, who had walked the fields and loved him. That's who God really wants in each of us. Not the person of power and prestige. Not the person with a lot of money and influence.

The child, with the child's heart for loving."

I am reminded over and over again that our Christian faith is so much more than a religion or a bunch of rituals that we follow throughout the liturgical year of the Church. The Christian faith is centered on a loving relationship with the Lord our God, who created us in the divine image, redeemed us through the Son, and dwells within us as the Holy Spirit. It's not a coincidence that, when asked, "Which commandment is the first of all?" Jesus immediately answered, "The first is, 'Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God, the Lord is one; you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength." Then Jesus quickly attached another piece to the first and greatest commandment when he said, "'You shall love your neighbor as yourself" (Mark 12:29-31). Jesus well understood both the vertical and the horizontal dimensions of our need to be in relationship with God and with others. God's love enables us to love and serve others.

It's good for us to return to the basics. John Killinger realized that what the Lord wanted more than anything else was God's "little boy back." God didn't want a list of all the books Killinger had written; God wasn't impressed with the big churches he had served; God wasn't overly awed by Killinger's influence and all of the important friends he had. Instead, the

Lord God yearned for the child, who had loved God early on in life, to continue to be in a loving relationship with the Almighty.

God desires the very same love from us. Created in God's own image, God hopes that we will love God for who God is - just as God does with us. And, because God so loved the world and gave us His Son, God delights in us whenever we share God's love with our neighbors (especially those in need) and enjoy God's love for ourselves as well.

Let me encourage all of us to be open to and on the lookout for God's love, which is lavished upon us. In response, let us love the Lord with every fiber of our being and with all that we have. And, be sure to pass God's love on to others. After all, "there really is no other commandment greater than these!"

Word from the Associate Pastor: A Worshipping Community For ALL Ages

As a community of faith – the "church" – one of the most central acts that we do is worship together. When we gather to worship each Lord's Day, we take time to direct our focus to God, and through the act of worship reorient our lives so that all we do may be to the glory of God. When a child is baptized and received into the family of faith, the whole congregation promises to guide and nurture the child by word and deed, with love and prayer, and to encourage them to know and follow Christ and to be faithful members of his Church. One way that we live out that promise is by showing children how to worship. According to John Westerhoff, a scholar in the field of Christian Education, children's presence in worship is not only important, but it is necessary if we are to be the whole people of God. He writes that faith is "caught" not "taught," and that children therefore learn the central act of worship by doing. Children watch and practice faithful worship precisely by being with the adult role models around them. In worship they learn that they belong to Christ and are welcome in his church. In worship they participate in prayer and praise, and hear scripture read and proclaimed and they come to know the presence of God through all these acts. One of the delightful ministries of this congregation is the Children's Worship program, which provides a time and place for young children (ages 3 through 1st grade) to "practice" worship and ask questions and learn from caring adults who lead them. As they "graduate" from this program and rejoin the larger worshipping community, they have learned the Lord's Prayer and other pieces of our service, so they can feel comfortable and at home as participating worshippers. I hope and pray that we all can receive the gifts of having these young worshippers in our midst. Their energy, joy and enthusiasm are contagious and they can indeed be signs of God's presence in our midst. As our Lord Jesus welcomed the children to come to him, let us also embrace and celebrate our gift of children and give thanks to God for their presence!

Operation Christmas Child The Shoe Box Project

This year the youth group is again taking part in a unique mission project called *Operation Christmas Child. Samaritan's Purse* operates a number of projects including *Operation Christmas Child*, a



program where shoeboxes are packed with personal hygiene items, school supplies, toys, and distributed to nearly 8 million children annually in 95 countries. *Samaritan's Purse* is an International Relief Organization under the direction of CEO and founder, Franklin Graham. To date, this organization has collected and distributed more than 69 million shoeboxes to boys and girls in over 135 countries.

People across the country are getting their items and donations ready to send to their churches. Our youth are asking that all families participate in this project in one of several ways:

- by bringing a filled shoebox with suggested items,
- 2) by bringing empty shoeboxes for the youth to pack (you know they are in your basement!)

- 3) by bringing donations of items on the suggested list below (no used or damaged items please!),
- 4) by making donations to help cover shipping cost (a box takes \$7 to ship worldwide)

Please bring your donation/gift to the church by October 31st. Donations of items and shoeboxes can be brought to Pastor Jenny's office, and monetary donations given to the church office. The youth will pack and gift wrap shoeboxes during youth group on November 7th. The boxes will be delivered to our local drop-off center the week of November 15th.

Operation Christmas Child is a great way to bring joy and the Good News of Jesus Christ to children in need of hope. What a perfect gift to give in honor of Jesus' birthday.

Gift Suggestions

Designate your box for the appropriate age category below: Girl or Boy: Ages (2-4 years), (5-9 years), or (10-14 years)

School Supplies: pens, pencils, and sharpeners, crayons or markers, stamps and ink pad sets, writing pads or paper, solar calculators, coloring and picture books, etc.

Toys: small cars, balls, dolls, stuffed animals, kazoos, harmonicas, yoyos, jump ropes, small Etch A Sketch, toys that light up or make noise (with extra batteries), Slinky, etc.

Hygiene Items: toothbrush, toothpaste,

mild bar soap (in plastic bag), comb, washcloth, etc.

Other: hard candy and lollipops (please double bag all candy), mints, gum, T-shirts, socks, ball caps, sunglasses, hair clips, toy jewelry, watches, flashlights (with extra batteries).

A Personal Note: In a separate envelope, you may enclose a note to the

child and a photo of yourself or your family. (If you include your name and address, the child may write back.)

DO NOT INCLUDE: Used or damaged items; war-related items such as toy guns, knives or military figures; chocolate or food; out–of-date candy; liquids or lotions; medications or vitamins; breakable items such as snow globes or glass containers; aerosol cans.
