From My Perspective Within The Kingdom

In the current issue of *The Christian Century* (January 11, 2011), I read that, within this year, the King James Version of the Bible will mark its 400th birthday. The article sent me to my book-shelves where I pulled out the very first Bible ever given to me; it was a King James Version of the Bible (red letter edition) that was presented to me by the Oak Hill Presbyterian Church's Sunday School on September 27, 1959. I also remember reading the King James Version of the Bible and not always understanding what the words were trying to convey.

Soon after, our church started using the Revised Standard Version of the Bible, and the Word of God became clearer and I could understand more of what I was reading. Then, when I was in high school, the *Good News for Modern Man* version of the Bible became available. I remember the simple line drawings throughout the Bible, which illustrated various passages, and I remember the language was indeed more modern, and thus, easier to read and comprehend.

I began my college years at the University of Missouri at St. Louis (UMSL) and, during my sophomore year I took a course entitled *The Old Testament as Literature*. The course was taught by a rabbi from one of the synagogues and he was sensitive to the fact that most of his students would be Christian instead of Jewish. Thus, he assigned *The Oxford Annotated Bible* (RSV) as the main text. This 1962 version of the Bible became the Bible that I read, studied, and meditated on throughout my college and seminary years and well into my first three pastorates. Besides the familiar language of the Revised Standard Version, the *Oxford Annotated* has scholarly study notes printed at the bottom of each page that pertain to the verses above. These additional notes helped to clarify what a particular verse said or gave helpful background information.

I used the *Oxford Annotated* RSV Bible for almost 30 years and even had it rebound on a couple of occasions. Then, a colleague of mine introduced me to the *Harper Collins Study Bible*, which uses the 1989 New Revised Standard Version of the Bible. This Bible also has helpful study notes at the bottom of each page along with other pertinent information spread throughout. I also keep a copy of The Message – paraphrasing translation of the Bible in contemporary language by Eugene H. Peterson – by my desk to consult at a moment's notice.

The point to all of this is to say that the Word of God is a living, breathing, dynamic Word that speaks to God's people throughout the centuries and in each particular situation. Each person has to find the translation that best speaks to her or him. Then, with the help of the Holy Spirit, we read God's holy Word and we seek to understand it, be guided by it, and, most of all, to live out the word in our daily lives.

In closing, I recall a former church member, who told me that, at her funeral, she wanted me to read John 14:1-6 from the King James Version of the Bible instead of the RSV. She went on to explain that the RSV said, "In my Father's house are many rooms," whereas the KJV said, "In my Father's house are many mansions," and she said, "I want to live in a mansion when I die because I've lived in rooms all of my life!" To each their own!

Planning for Worship

What about the Congregational Choir? How can it prepare? Check out the following suggestions.

1. Make sure you have access to an Order of Worship, a Bible and a Hymn Book. Most of the time the ushers will provide you with the order for that service. These are your worship tools.

2. Check the hymns and scripture which will be used that day. If these are unfamiliar, spend some time and get familiar with them. Much of the time the hymns are focused on God, our faith, and our response to the gospel.

3. The scripture closest to the sermon is usually the springboard into that material. As the message unfolds, you might want to take notes on points which touched you in some special way.

4. As the service concludes, the focus usually narrows to our response to what the service has been about that day. Perhaps God has spoken to you through the elements of the service as you have spoken to Him through the congregational material.

Seek to put worship and your response to each as one of your priorities each week.

We continue to worship the Lord early on Sunday mornings with joy, love and grace. Please come and see what the excitement is all about. Gathering music begins at 8:35 am and worship is completed around 9:30am. There is time for fellowship before Sunday school begins. ATTENTION Red Cross Bloodmobile and Church Responsibility at Liberty Fair Mall No Money Involved

Please consider this appeal for volunteers who would b e ale to fill the three stations of duty, when necessary, for one of the three-hour shifts the fourth Thursday of each month (except November) from 12:00-3:00 and 3:00-6:00 P.M. They are:

1. Receptionist who will welcome a potential donor, register the name as a new

or repeat donor, and invite them to be seated to review the general requirements for their ability to safely donate while waiting to be called by the staff nurse for the health interview.

2. 'Walker' who will tend to the needs of the nurse and donor (such as serving water

or juice, giving an encouraging word) and escorting the Donor to the observation area when completed.

3. One who will offer the donor to be refreshed with water or juice and crackers, to rest for at least 15 minutes and make an appointment for another visit. Observe for any

signs of illness, fainting or bleeding. A staff nurse is ready and available to take control when indicated.

Volunteers NEVER come in contact with the Donor's blood. The regular staff personnel will inform you of the exact procedure required for your station when you arrive, and are ready to assist with any questions and responsibilities.

We welcome and encourage YOU, as faithful church members to check if you are eligible with healthy blood to donate each time you visit. Please allow a total time of approximately 1 hour, more or less. Each freely given pint of blood received contributes to the healing and restoration of better health to the patient that money cannot buy. PANDAMANIA VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH JULY 11 – 15

All about Pandas:

- 1. The head of a Panda is very large and has developed special molars for chewing plants. It has powerful muscles which extend from the top of its head to the jaws giving it the ability to crush very tough stalks. Their esophagus has a though lining to protect the Panda from bamboo splinters. The stomach is protected too, with a thick muscular lining.
- 2. Panda Bears eat over fifteen different kinds of Bamboo. Because of an inefficient intestinal system the Panda must feed for 12 to 16 hours a day, they can consume 22 to 40 pounds of Bamboo each day. When they eat fresh Bamboo shoots they eat about 84 pounds every day.
- 3. The Panda lives in only six small areas located in China. The habitat, suitable for the bamboo on which it survives, is a cold, damp coniferous forest. The elevation ranges from 4,000 to 11,000 feet high. They often must compete with farmers who farm the river valleys and the lower slopes of the mountains.
